Task Force on Biological Resource Center Network (BRC)

- Report on BIM workshop (held on Nov 2)
- <u>Country reports on the current status of bioresource information management</u>
 Nine ACM country representatives (Cambodia, China, Japan, Korea, Mongolia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Thailand and Vietnam) reported the current status of bioresource information management.
- Proposal to establish Working Group

•Dr. Suzuki proposed to establish a working group (WG) to produce a prototype of Asian BRC network. The members of the WG were tentatively considered to include Mr. Ma (IM-CAS, China), Ms. Wanchern (BIOTEC, Thailand), Dr. Park (KRIBB, Korea) and Dr. Suzuki (NITE, Japan). Their task will be to establish a prototype of network by linking BRCs and also to extract items to standardize a network. As the first step, the WG will construct a prototype database, using data from Dr. Supawadee Ingsriswang obtained from eight centers of six countries (Cambodia, Indonesia, Korea, Philippines, Thailand, Vietnam).
